Bat Kohen/Bat Levi

A position adopted within our movement affirms that a woman whose father is a Kohen or Levite may consider herself a Bat Kohen or Bat Levi for the purpose of receiving the Kohen or Levi Alivah when she comes to the Torah. We will embrace them as being eligible to take such honors on those occasions when we call people to the Torah as Kohen or Levi. We know that not all women will choose to do this, but for those who do, once they have claimed this status, from that point on they will be eligible only for the Kohen or Levi Aliyah. If you are a Bat Kohen or Bat Levi, please let Rabbi Robert Eisen know so that we can be sure to look for you when assigning the honors.

One of the most important values we can share is the importance of Shabbat worship, together as families. Geniza Field Trip

As part of the lifecycle curriculum, our 5th & 6th Grade classes will be taking a field trip to Evergreen Cemetery on **Sunday, March 5**. While there, I will point out the graves of those who are so much a part of the history of our congregation as well as Tucson at large and teach the students about our *geniza* (a place where worn ritual objects and sacred texts are buried), and lead a short service which will include the burial of items that we have collected over the year.

This trip is meant to remind us of how much we stand on the shoulders of those who came before us and to help us to feel more comfortable with regard to our cemetery. This is a very important part of our curriculum and is meant to be an important experience for our children.

Because, over the past years (we take this Field Trip every other year), so many of you have expressed a desire to have been part of this event — because this is truly a unique learning experience — we invite you to join us. We'll begin sometime **10:00-10:15am** (start time will depend on how long it takes to get our students from Religious School to the cemetery), and conclude 11:00-11:30am (depending on questions, etc.). ARBA PARSHIOT: Special Sabbaths

During the month or so before Passover, four Shabbatot are characterized by special Maftir readings, called the Arba Parshiot [four Torah portions], which relate thematically to Passover or Purim: Shabbat Shekalim, Shabbat Zakhor, Shabbat Parah, Shabbat Hahodesh, Shabbat Hagadol.

SHABBAT ZAKHOR (March 10 & 11)

Shabbat Zakhor, whose maftir reading, Deuteronomy 25:17-19, is an admonition to remember Amalek, the nation that surprised the Israelites wandering in the desert after the Exodus from Egypt with a rear attack on the stragglers. The Israelites constituted no military threat, leading some Jewish commentators to view Amalek as rebels against God, because they were trying to destroy the Israelites. God commands the Israelites, therefore, that when safely settled in Palestine, "You shall blot out the memory of Amalek from under heaven."

The Torah instructs Jews to "remember Amalek," a commandment fulfilled each year by publicly reading this passage on the Shabbat before Purim, because Haman, the arch-villain of the Scroll of Esther [megillat Esther], who tries to kill the Jews of Persia, is an Amalekite. The haftarah reading is I Samuel 15:2-34, which describes Saul's war with Amalek.

SHABBAT PARAH (March 17 & 18)

Shabbat Parah, the Sabbath of the Red Heifer, occurs on the Shabbat prior to Shabbat Hahodesh of the month of Nisan. The maftir reading, Numbers 19:1-22, deals with the red heifer whose ashes were combined with water to ritually purify anyone who had been in contact with a dead person. Because only people who were pure could eat from the Passover sacrifice, a public announcement right before Nisan reminded anyone who had become impure to purify themselves before making the Passover pilgrimage to Jerusalem.

The haftarah. Ezekiel 36:16-38, also deals with issues of being cleansed from contamination, but the impurity in this case symbolizes human sinfulness. But, like physical impurity, sins can be overcome. As God says in Ezekiel 36:25,26: "I will sprinkle clean water upon you, and you shall be clean: I will cleanse you from all your uncleanness and from all your fetishes [idolatrous practices]. And I will give you a new heart and put a new spirit into you." This renewal of self and nation reflects Passover's theme of redemption.

SHABBAT HAHODESH (March 24 & 25)

Shabbat Hahodesh occurs either on the Shabbat before Rosh Hodesh Nisan or on Rosh Hodesh itself. The maftir reading is Exodus 12:1-20, which details eating the Passover sacrifice, with "your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand"; eating bitter herbs and unleavened bread; and putting blood on the doorposts; and it lists the Passover laws. The first day of Nisan is also important as the occasion for God's first commandment, sanctifying the new moon, which begins the Torah reading, "This month shall mark for you the beginning of the months; it shall be the first of the months of the year for you." This commandment moved the determination of months from God's agenda into the hands of the Jewish people, giving them control over time and the theological/ liturgical cycle. The haftarah, Ezekiel 45:16-46:18, describes the sacrifices that the Israelites are to bring on the first of Nisan, on Passover, and on other festivals in the future Temple.

SHABBAT HAGADOL (April 7 & 8)

The Shabbat before Pesah is called Shabbat HaGadol, the Great Sabbath. As the Israelites were preparing to leave Egypt, God commanded them to select a lamb that would serve as the Passover sacrifice. This mitzvah, or commandment, required the Israelites to actively participate in the redemption from Egypt. The name Shabbat HaGadol literally comes from a verse in the day's haftarah, Malachi 3:4-24. "Lo, I will send the prophet Elijah to you before the coming of the awesome, fearful day of the Lord," which alludes to a messianic future.

The past redemption at Passover is tied to the future messianic redemption, which, according to tradition, will also take place on Passover. Traditional practices on Shabbat HaGadol include reciting special hymns about the laws of Passover, reading the part of the Haggadah that begins with Avadim Hayinu, "We were slaves," and listening to the community's outstanding Torah scholar address the congregation on the laws of Passover.



Daily Minyan Services & "Jewry" Duty

Our Minyan is expected to be there when someone needs to say Kaddish, but there are times when it is difficult

to get a Minyan. Along with your "Jewry Duty," please consider being part of the Minyan at least one morning or afternoon per month on a regular basis. I remember when the pews in the sanctuary were yellow. I used to come with my Bubi Kel (Clara Levin) to Shabbat Services. These days, on Shabbat, I find myself sitting in the same area that I sat with her. And every Shabbat, I still wait (half expecting) to hear that final, extra, "Ush'mo Echad," at the

end of the Reader's Kaddish as Cantor Falkow (of blessed memory) used to do. My daughter went to our preschool and made friends that she still has today. When we moved back to Tucson, we watched with joy as our teenagers developed deep relationships with our clergy. Today, as young adults, they are thrilled to get holiday cards from the Rabbi or to come to a Kiddush for a quick round of hugs.

When my mother died unexpectedly, the Rabbi was at the hospital in what seemed like minutes. At the meeting before the funeral, he mentioned something about saying Kaddish for 11 months; I remember thinking, "Okay then, that's what I'm going to do." And then I did it. I said Kaddish for 11 months, even when I was traveling for work.

But it was here, in our chapel that first day after the funeral, that I realized that I needed this place. My need to be here was as real and as palpable as the chair I was sitting in and the Siddur I was holding. It was in our chapel and with our community of minyan-goers that grief became normal and okay. It became something to own and to honor. I learned that everyone is "One in a minyan," but especially when you are number 10. And somewhere in there, the grief diminished.

Why am I telling you all this? Because we all have these stories and reasons for being here. These are my "whys" when someone asks, "Why Anshei Israel?" Why commit so much time; don't you have a full time job?" Or simply, "Tell me about your synagogue." So now it's my turn to ask you: What are your whys?

In every part of our lives, Congregation Anshei Israel is here for us. We can and we do count on it. As you think through your "whys," I am going to assert something: We need Congregation Anshei Israel. This is our spiritual home. This is where we celebrate our *simchas* and mourn our losses. This is where we inventory our lives on Rosh Hashanah and commit to being better people in the year to come. And, most importantly, it is where we teach our children to be proud to be Jewish and live their lives Jewishly.

To that end, the time has come to honor Lynne Falkow-Strauss and the amazing legacy of her work at Congregation Anshei Israel's Preschool/Kindergarten. We have found an exciting way to do this, while at the same time, to enhance the beauty and safety of our school: the renovation of the Administrative Office and Preschool/Kindergarten entrance and the area outside that entrance. The new area will be called the "Lynne Falkow-Strauss Foyer and Courtyard."

The courtyard will be renovated with seating, shade structures and an area for children to play and for parents to gather. There are opportunities for you and your family to participate in honoring Lynne. I ask you to consider doing so as you think of your most important "whys."

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
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
