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

Shiv'a Asar B'Tammuz

The 17th of *Tammuz* is observed as a fast commemorating the breaking down of the wall of Jerusalem by Nebuchadnezzar and the cessation of Temple worship during the siege of Titus. It ushers in the three weeks of mourning which end with *Tisha* B'Av, the fast of the ninth day of Av.

The three weeks between *Shiv'a Asar B'Tammuz* and *Tisha B'A*v are referred to as "between the straits," a phrase borrowed from Lamentations 1:3. The *Mishnah* mentions five misfortunes that befell the Jewish people on the 17^{th} of *Tammuz* and five on the ninth of *Av* (*Ta'Anit* 4:6).

The three weeks are concluded with the so-called Nine Days, from the first to the ninth of Av, during which the mourning is intensified until *Tisha* B'Av itself — the saddest day of the Jewish year.

This year the observance of the Fast of the 17th of Tammuz falls on July 11. Mincha will be held at 12:30pm.


SHABBAT HAZON and SHABBAT NAHAMU

The Sabbaths surrounding the Ninth of Av carry a clear message relating to the holiday. The prophetic readings for the three weeks preceding the holiday — the first two from Jeremiah and the third from Isaiah - are full of admonitions in preparation for this mournful time. Following Tisha B'Av, there are seven prophetic readings of consolation - all from Isaiah — providing comfort after this somber occasion and preparing the individual emotionally and spiritually for the upcoming High Holy Days. The Sabbaths that immediately precede and follow Tisha B'Av each have a special name reflecting the message of the respective Haftarah (prophetic reading).

The Sabbath immediately preceding the Ninth of Av is known as the Sabbath of Vision (Hazon) for the prophetic reading Isaiah 1:1-27. After recounting heinous transgressions, it offers the hope of reconciliation, which will come when the people "cease to do evil, learn to do good." The Sabbath of Vision and Shabbat Nahamu, which provides words of consolation a week later, embrace Tisha B'Av from opposite sides, cushioning the blow of the day of destruction, allowing the mourners to go into it knowing there is salvation and emerge from it reassured that redemption will come. The entire portion [of Shabbat Hazon] may be chanted to the melody of Eicha (Lamentations); more appropriately, only the verses of admonition are rendered in the subdued chant.

The upswing of hope begun on the afternoon of *Tisha B'Av* continues on the following *Shabbat*. Called *Shabbat Nahamu* (Console) after the first line of the day's prophetic reading (*Nahamu, Nahamu Ami,* "Console, console my people ...") (Isaiah 40:1-26), it is also the first of seven *Haftarot* of consolation, all drawn from the book of Isaiah, that deliver a message of comfort in the seven weeks following *Tisha B'Av* and lead us to the period of *Rosh Hashanah* (49:14-51:3; 54:11-55:5; 51:12-52:12; 54:1-10; 60:1-22; 61:10-63:9).

This year, Shabbat Hazon falls on July 28-29; Shabbat Nahamu falls on August 4-5.



The ninth day of *Av*, mentioned in Zechariah 8:19 as the "Fast of the Fifth" month, commemorates such national calamities as the destruction of both Temples, the fall of Bar Kokhba's fortress, Bethar, and the expulsion from Spain in 1492. According to tradition, both the First and Second Temples were destroyed on the ninth of *Av*, the day referred to as predestined to misfortune. *Tisha B'Av* resembles *Yom Kippur* in its restrictions upon eating and bathing, maintained from sunset to sunset.

The three weeks between the 17^{th} of *Tammuz* and the ninth of Av are observed by abstaining from all festivities and joyous celebrations. But when the month of Av has begun, all enjoyment should be reduced. It has long been the custom in Israel to eat no meat (except on the Sabbath) from the first day of Av until after the fast.

On the ninth of Av, when the Book of Lamentations and other dirges (*kinot*) are recited, before congregations seated on low stools as a sign of mourning, the curtain (*Parokhet*) is removed from the Ark (*Aron Ha-Kodesh*), and visits are made to cemeteries, in order to stress the sense of mourning. The morning service is recited without *tallit* or *tefillin*; these are worn during the *Mincha* service. The elegies known as *kinot* are descriptive, not only of the calamities connected with the destruction of Jerusalem, but also of the Jewish catastrophes that occurred in various lands of persecution.

This year, the Ninth of Av observance/fast begins on the evening of July 31 and continues through August 1.


Family Shabbat Experience Service & Dinner

Jewish Federation of Southern Arizona:

After redesigning its planning and allocation process to include synagogues as one of its funding groups, the JFSA Board included in its allocations for this year over \$100,000 for synagogues who are members of the Federation-Synagogue Dialogue for Religious School and Family Education Programs ... endeavors that strive to provide opportunities and incentives for increased engagement. Our allocation came to \$24,250 (based on proportional census of children 0 to 18-years-old).

We are looking forward to using these funds to expand and enhance several of our already existing programs, and introducing some new initiatives (which are being planned even as you read this).

Again, we are most grateful to the JFSA for its support and encouragement of what we do so well.

Jewish Community Foundation of Southern Arizona:

It is with a great deal of appreciation that we acknowledge the receipt of \$5,000 from the Jewish Community Foundation of Southern Arizona in collaboration with the Jewish Federation of Southern Arizona through their Tucson Synagogue Small Grants Program. 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From the President

An excerpt from the journal I kept while saying Kaddish for my mother: October 17, 2012

... and so ended *Shloshim*. My father is now free to not attend *Minyan* every day, and he will go back to his usual once a week schedule. Honestly, I was looking forward to this: It's all on me now. How will the rest of the year go? Will I get tired of making the accommodations? Will I be resentful or get frustrated? What about my husband, Spencer? What else will this bring up? Will I feel my mother when I need to? Will going to services bring me closer to CAI? I now love the woman who attends *Minyan* every day, the one with the bright red hair, Ziva. And Jerry and Art and John, Patty, Arnie, Dennis, Morris, Moshe, Bea, and...

I made it to *Mincha* tonight, but was late. Rabbi Eisen is talking about some of the rules around Yahrzeit. If more than one person is there for *Yahrzeit*, who gets to *daven*? There are rules, and it's spelled out in the Torah whose *Yahrzeit* is more important. I'm smug as I think, "Of course, a parent trumps all." Then he moves on to saying *Kaddish*. Why say it? It's not about death or mourning – it never even mentions anything but the glory and greatness of God. And then the part that God created us to be part of this world, God's world, and when someone dies it diminishes God's creation. Then Rabbi says, "So, we say *Kaddish* because God is sad and we want to make God feel better." My eyes immediately tear up and overflow. Only Rabbi sees this. He takes it in silently and is just "there" with me.

That night, Stuart and Michael Mendel are in attendance saying *Kaddish* for their father. I tell them I am sorry for their loss. A week or so later, Rabbi Ben Herman adds my mother to the *el malei*. Stuart is there again and inquires as to who she is. I tell him and he says he is sorry for my loss. This is how community is built when your kids are too old for play dates and carpools.

So then what?

Four and a half years later, my father still goes to *Minyan* almost every day. I think initially it was to make sure there was a *Minyan* for me and then it became part of his day, part of his

community. How did the rest of my year go? Well, it was hard but I said *Kaddish* every day. There wasn't always a *Minyan* and sometimes when I traveled I wasn't counted...but I showed up. I never got tired of going; it was just what I was supposed to do. Spencer mourned my mother in his own way, but honored her by supporting me in going to services every day; not once did he challenge my commitment or suggest I blow it off.

Did it bring me closer to CAI, to my synagogue, to my fellow congregants, to God? Yes. Suddenly, beyond raising my children, being a part of making sure this place thrives and flourishes became very important to me. Dennis Dawson and Arnie Merin taught me how to *daven* and eventually I was able to do the repetition of the *Amidah*. Madeline Friedman asked me to be on the Board of Trustees, and Richard Fink took me under his wing. Ron Gray asked me to hold the Torah while Nichole Chorny chanted the Prayer for the New Month ... then Ron told me I was the first woman to do that at CAI. I learned to do *Hagbah*. Little do people know how good I am at *Gelilah*! And now, I begin my two-year term as President of the Board of Trustees.

This is a bit of my story about how I am living my Judaism together with you, my *Kehilah*. What's your story?

Shloshim: The 30 day period following burial.
Minyan: The quorum of 10 Jewish adults required for certain religious obligations (and what we call morning and evening services).
Yahrzeit: The anniversary of a death observed each year on the Hebrew date of death by reciting the mourner's kaddish at synagogue.
Daven: To pray, lead prayers.
Kaddish: Specifically the Mourner's Kaddish, a prayer said as part of the mourning rituals in Judaism. One says the Mourner's Kaddish for 30 days for a sibling, spouse or child; 11 months for a parent.
El malei: A prayer said for the soul of the departed.
Amidah: The central prayer of Jewish liturgy.
Hagbah: Person who lifts the Torah after it is read.

Gelilah: Person who wraps the Torah while the Hagbah sits and holds it. *Kehilah*: Hebrew for congregation, community.

Archaeological Discoveries Further Validate Jewish Ties to Israel

This year, July 31 marks the start of Tisha B'Av, a fast day on the Hebrew calendar commemorating the destruction of the First and Second Temples in Jerusalem and the subsequent expulsion of most Jews from the Land of Israel. While in exile, the dispersed Jewish people yearned for and maintained an unbroken connection to the land of their ancestors. Despite indisputable historical, biblical and archeological evidence that ties the Jewish people to the Land of Israel, modern-day detractors continually attempt to diminish and deny this millennia-old connection.

Most recently, the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) passed a resolution in May 2017—on Israel's Independence Day—that denied Israeli claims to Jerusalem. UNESCO passed an even more egregious resolution in October 2016 that only referred to the Temple Mount by its Islamic name, erasing Jewish links to their ancient capital city.

Fortunately, a number of recent archaeological discoveries provide additional proof to refute such assertions, confirming the actual physical connection between the Jewish people and the Land of Israel, including Jerusalem.

In October 2016, the Israel Antiquities Authority uncovered an ancient papyrus from the First Temple period that has the earliest Hebrew reference to Jerusalem, apart from the Bible. Dating back to seventh century BCE, the document is one of three existing Hebrew papyri from that era and the first nonbiblical source to mention Jerusalem from that time period, predating the Dead Sea Scrolls by several centuries.

In September 2016, scientists formally announced that they had restored a 2,000-year-old biblical text, known as the Ein Gedi Scroll. The scroll, which contains the Book of Leviticus, was found in the burnt-out Holy Ark of an ancient synagogue in Israel. It is the oldest biblical text that has been unearthed since the discovery of the Dead Sea Scrolls and the earliest copy of one of the five books of Moses to be found in a Holy Ark.

In August 2016, archaeologists discovered a synagogue in the Galilee that predates the destruction of the Second Temple. Seven other such synagogues have been discovered in Israel, but this was the first one unearthed in a rural setting. Unlike synagogues built after the Second Temple's destruction, those built before were not used for regular worship, but were instead utilized for Torah readings, meetings and study.

Israel's detractors and international organizations like UNESCO continue to deny the Jewish connection Ito Jerusalem, but these discoveries provide the latest evidence in support of the historical truth that we commemorate on Tisha B'Av: The history, culture and religion of the Jewish people are inextricably tied to the Land of Israel.





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
