



Bat Kohen/Bat Levi

A position adopted within our movement affirms that a woman whose father is a Kohen or Levite may consider herself a Bat Kohen or Bat Levi for the purpose of receiving the Kohen or Levi Aliyah when she comes to the Torah. We will embrace them as being eligible to take such honors on those occasions when we call people to the Torah as Kohen or Levi. We know that not all women will choose to do this, but for those who do, once they have claimed this status, from that point on they will be eligible only for the Kohen or Levi Aliyah. If you are a Bat Kohen or Bat Levi, please let Rabbi Robert Eisen know so that we can be sure to look for you when assigning the honors.







What Is Lag B'Omer?

This minor holiday is known for bonfires, weddings and haircuts.

Lag B'Omer is a minor holiday that occurs on the 33rd day of the Omer, the 49-day period between Passover and Shavuot. A break from the semi-mourning of the Omer, key aspects of Lag B'Omer include holding Jewish weddings (it's the one day during the Omer when Jewish law permits them), lighting bonfires and getting haircuts.







forbidden, and as a sign of grief, observant Jews do not cut their hair. The most often cited explanation for the Jewish practice comes from the Talmud, which tells us that during this season a plague killed thousands of Rabbi Akiva's students because they did not treat one another respectfully. The mourning behavior is presumably in memory of those students and their severe punishment.

According to a medieval tradition, the plague ceased on Lag B'Omer, the 33rd day of the Omer. (The Hebrew letters *lamed* and *gimel* which make up the acronym "Lag" have the combined numerical value of 33.) As a result, Lag B'Omer became a happy day, interrupting the sadness of the Omer period for 24 hours.

A completely different reason for the holiday concerns one of Rabbi Akiva's few disciples who survived the Bar Kochba revolt, Rabbi Simeon bar Yohai. He is said to have died on Lag B'Omer. Tradition ascribes to him the Zohar, the key work of the Kabbalah. And in Israel, on Lag B'Omer, people flock to the site of his tomb in the village of Meron in the Galilee, near Safed, where they light bonfires and sing kabbalistic hymns. Hasidic Jews follow the custom of bringing their 3-year-old sons to Meron to have their hair cut for the first time. (The custom of not cutting the child's hair until his third birthday, when it is done in a ceremony called an *upsheren*, is probably an extension of the law that forbids picking the fruits of a newly planted tree during its first three years.)

Kabbalists also give a mystical interpretation to the Omer period as a time of spiritual cleansing and preparation for receiving the Torah on Shavuot. The days and weeks of counting, they say, represent various combinations of the sefirot, the divine emanations, whose contemplation ultimately leads to purity of mind and soul. The somberness of this period reflects the seriousness of its spiritual pursuits.

Finally, on yet another tack, some authorities attribute the joy of Lag B'Omer to the belief that the manna that fed the Israelites in the desert first appeared on the 18th of Iyar.

Though its origins are uncertain, Lag B'Omer has become a minor holiday. Schoolchildren picnic and play outdoors with bows and arrows — a possible reminder of the war battles of Akiva's students — and in Israel plant trees. It is customary to light bonfires, to symbolize the light Simeon bar Yohai brought into the world. And every year numerous couples wed at this happy time.

From the President



You know what they say, "The only constant is change." Well, we recently heard from Rabbi Robert Eisen that he is choosing to leave our congregation at the end of his term in June 2020; and, I will not be the President of the Board of Trustees for much longer. Change often causes anxiety but it is my hope that transparency will provide some much-needed perspective and comfort.

So in this, my last *Kolenu* article as President, I'd like to share with you a little more about our rabbinic

transition. As I mentioned in my letter that accompanied Rabbi Eisen's, your Officers, Rabbi Eisen and Executive Director Debra Lytle met to discuss our strategy for this process. We outlined a timeline and discussed the multiple tasks ahead of us. While we are still early in the planning phase, I want to give you an update. First, I realized shortly after Rabbi's announcement that the tasks related to changing our rabbinic leadership is too big a responsibility for one person. As such, I have asked Phillip Pepper to co-chair the process with me and he has graciously agreed. We will share the overall planning process with you at the **88th Annual Meeting on Monday, May 13**.

We are currently pulling together a Task Force for Strategic Development and Rabbinic Transition. Rabbi Eisen likes to say, "We are a congregation of congregations;" to that end, we are focused on identifying people from the various "congregations" within our congregation to ensure representation for all of us. To further guarantee that everyone has an opportunity to share their thoughts, we will be sending out an electronic survey in the coming weeks. The office can also provide a hard copy for you to complete if needed. Additionally, we will be conducting focus groups to dig deeper into who we are and our vision for the future. These focus groups will take place in the spring and into the summer. It may interest you to know that in order to attract the type of spiritual leader our congregation desires, requires and deserves, it's not enough to just say what we want, we must first do a little "soul searching" and be able to articulate who we are as a Conservative congregation (in Tucson) and our vision for the future. Please take the time to really think about it as you complete the survey, participate in a focus group or engage with me or others directly involved with the process.

We anticipate utilizing the services of the Rabbinic Assembly of United Synagogues of Conservative Judaism, United Synagogues of Conservative Judaism itself and other consultants to assist us in assessing where we are currently, as well as our vision for the future. Please be sure to join us at the Annual Meeting when we will provide a more detailed outline/timeline for this next chapter in CAI's history. We plan to be in communication with the congregation on a regular basis. Look for email updates, information on our website and in the *Kolenu*. If you have questions about the process or feel like you are not getting the updates you need, please let me know.

On a personal note, it has been an honor and a privilege to serve as your president these past two years. We truly are a congregation of congregations, all with different needs, desires, commitments and viewpoints. My commitment has been to work to ensure that CAI provides the space and the opportunity for everyone to be welcomed and inspired to Live Y/Our Judaism Together. I ask your understanding and forgiveness for where I fell short and I offer my sincere gratitude for the opportunity to work to make a difference for my *shul*.

MIDDLE EAST SPOTLIGHT

Israel and the United States: An Unbreakable Partnership

As America's closest ally in the Middle East, Israel is an anchor of stability in an ever more dangerous and unpredictable region. The two allies have formed an unbreakable partnership, based on a dedication to common values and interests. The United States and Israel have developed deep strategic ties to confront common threats and ensure the security of the Jewish state. This strategic relationship is a key pillar of America's Middle East security framework, and this partnership is constantly growing and expanding into new areas.

Today, Israel faces an unprecedented array of evolving threats stemming from the growing regional turmoil fueled by Iran's unceasing aggression. These challenges require Israel to significantly increase its defense budget. By providing security assistance to Israel, the United States safeguards the Jewish state's qualitative military edge (QME) over its adversaries and enhances the safety and security of both nations. In addition a robust and foreign aid program ensures America's strong leadership position in the world.

At just one percent of the federal budget, foreign aid is a cost-effective and relatively small investment that saves U.S. taxpayer money by helping prevent more costly wars, crises and disasters. In fact, over 75 percent of our assistance to Israel comes back to the United States through the purchase of U.S.-made aircraft and other equipment. Foreign aid enables the United States to support key allies like Israel, spur our job-creating exports, and help prevent unstable areas from becoming breeding grounds for terrorism.

In addition, non-defense related joint U.S.-Israeli programs have made America stronger through the development and introduction of technologies relating to energy efficiency, cybersecurity and water scarcity. Israel has in recent years brought some of these technologies to the developing world—furthering sustainability, helping lift millions out of poverty and creating enormous possibilities of cooperation between Israel and our development agencies.

The broader U.S. foreign aid budget, which includes security assistance to Israel, is an essential component of America's national security strategy. Beyond aid to Israel, overall U.S. foreign aid also helps American companies develop foreign markets, build stable business environments in developing countries, and thereby create jobs at home. Foreign aid programs also help bring education, health care and transportation to hundreds of millions of potential new customers. Today, one in five American jobs is linked to U.S. exports.

Few can predict what the coming years will bring in the Middle East, but one thing remains certain: Israeli security and U.S.-Israel cooperation are deeply in the American interest. Maintaining deep bipartisan support in Congress for this vital partnership will remain even more critical as America and Israel continue to work together to meet the challenges that lie ahead, and to advance the goals of a peaceful, stable and pro-Western Middle East.



COMING UP...

SHAVUOT: THE FORGOTTEN HOLIDAY

The Shavuot Festival, otherwise known as Pentecost (50th day) or Feast of Weeks, was celebrated primarily as a thanksgiving for the wheat harvest; it falls seven weeks after the barley harvest, when an Omer of the new produce was offered. The Torah refers to Shavuot as Hag Ha-Katsir (The Feast of the Harvest) and Yom Ha-Bikkurim (The Day of First Fruits), observed by offerings of the best ripe produce of the fields (Exodus 23:16; Numbers 28:26).

In the course of time, and as a result of the transformation of the agricultural festivals into historical commemorations, the additional significance of Shavuot as the festival of the Giving of the Torah (Z'man Matan Torateynu) at Mount Sinai completely overshadowed its original significance. Though the Bible does not identify Shavuot with the anniversary of the giving of the Ten Commandments, the tradition, undisputed in the Talmud, has been that the Torah was given on the sixth day of Sivan.

Shavuot is called Atzeret in the Mishnah and the Talmud, in the sense that it serves as a concluding festival to *Pesah*. In the observances of *Shavuot*, the historical as well as the agricultural aspects are reflected. The Decalogue is read in the synagogue on the first day. The first night of the festival is often spent in reading an anthology of sacred writings called *Tikkun Leil Shavuot*. The Book of Ruth is read for its description of a summer harvest in Israel. Milk dishes are the customary foods, symbolizing the Torah which is likened to milk, according to the allegorical interpretation of the Song of Songs, "honey and milk are under your tongue."


