The Tenth of Tevet • Asarah B'Tevet

 \sim Date of the fast in 5780: January 7 \sim

Coming as it does a week after the last day of Hanukkah, the fast on the 10th of the month of Tevet (Asarah B'Tevet) might easily be overlooked. It occupies, however, an important niche in the story of Israel and the history of our people.

The text in II Kings (25:1-4) tells us that on the 10th day of the 10th month, in the ninth year of his reign, (588 BCE), Nebuchadnezzar, the Babylonian king, began the siege of Jerusalem. Three years later, on the 17th of Tammuz, he broke through the city walls. The siege ended with the destruction of the Temple three weeks later, on the 9th of Av, the end of the first Kingdom and the exile of the Jewish people to Babylon. It can thus be considered part of the cycle of fasts connected with these events: Tzom Gedaliah (3rd of Tishrei); Shivah Asar B'Tammuz (17th of Tammuz) and Tisha B'Av (9th of Av).

The first mention of this fast appears in Zechariah (8:19) where it is called the "fast of the tenth month..." (counting from the month of Nisan, which was the first month in Biblical times). Other references to the fast and the affliction can be found in Ezekiel 24:1-2 (the siege); Jeremiah 52:4-6.

However, although the fast is historically tied in with events surrounding the destruction of the First Temple, the purpose of the fast is not the commemoration of an historical event, but the state of affliction of the Jewish people.

- As with all Jewish fasts, the prayers for Asarah B'Tevet include Selihot, marking the day as an occasion for each of us to devote time to Teshuvah (repentance), the introspection that motivates us to reexamine our actions and change our ways. As the Talmud in Brachot says, "one who is afflicted should examine his or her actions and do Teshuvah."
- Asarah B'Tevet is the day of mourning for people whose last resting place or date of death is unknown (the Kaddish Clali).
- Asarah B'Tevet is one of four public fasts which begin at dawn (alot hashachar - about an hour before sunrise), but does not carry additional restrictions, such as washing oneself or wearing leather shoes, etc. (while Yom Kippur and Tisha B'Av begin from dusk the night before). However, it is the only fast which is not brought forward or postponed if it falls on a Friday, a mark of its immense significance.

Tu B'Shevat The semi-holiday, Chamishah Asar B'Shevat (15th day of Shevat) marks the first day of spring in Israel. It occurs

six weeks after Hanukkah. The Mishnah refers to it as Rosh Hashanah L'Ilanot (New Year of the Trees). Since ancient times, the Jewish people have observed it by eating fruit grown in Israel. With the rise of the Zionist movement and the re-establishment of the land of Israel, Tu B'Shevat has gained new significance as Arbor Day, observed by the planting of trees in Israel.

Trees were regarded as special gifts from God. There are many symbolic allusions to trees in the Bible, especially the olive, which sends up new shoots to continue the life of the old tree that dies. Trees are represented as symbols of goodness and nobility. The upright person is compared to "a tree planted near a stream, that bears fruit in due season, with leaves that never fade" (Psalm 1:3). "The righteous will flourish like the palm tree; they will grow like a cedar in Lebanon" (Psalm 92: 13-14).

Not too long ago, it was customary among many of our people to plant a tree when a child was born — a cedar for a boy and a cypress for a girl. Branches from these trees were then used for the poles of the wedding canopy (chuppah) on the day of their marriage.

In our day, many people purchase trees in Israel through the Jewish National Fund (JNF). If interested in purchasing a tree or making a donation to the JNF for reclamation of the land of Israel, please contact the JNF at 800-542-TREE (8733).

ARBA PARSHIOT During the month or so before Passover, four Shabbatot are characterized by special Maftir **Special Sabbaths** readings, called the Arba Parshiot [four Torah

portions], which relate thematically to Passover or Purim: Shabbat Shekalim, Shabbat Zakhor, Shabbat Parah, and Shabbat Hahodesh.

SHABBAT SHEKALIM (February 21/22)

SHABBAT SHEKALIM — which takes place the SHABBAT prior to ROSH HODESH for the month of ADAR or on SHABBAT ROSH HODESH ADAR itself — is named for the MAFTIR reading, Exodus 30:11. The MAFTIR describes a census requiring every Israelite man to contribute a half-SHEKEL to support communal sacrifices in the portable Tent Of Meeting and later at the Temple. The egalitarian nature of this contribution is emphasized — "the rich shall not pay more, and the poor shall not pay less than half a SHEKEL." The requirement that all individuals contribute equally to the community helped develop a sense of unity crucial to the new nation created by the Exodus. In the special Haftarah, 2 Kings 11:17-12:17, King Yehoash commanded that all money brought to the Temple be used for its repairs and renovations — both

the required contributions and the free-will offerings. SHABBAT SHEKALIM occurs about a month before Passover as a reminder that the due date for the half-shekel contributions was approaching, on 1 NISAN, a month later. Some people contribute to an institution of Jewish learning in remembrance of the half-SHEKEL

Adar I and The Hebrew/Jewish calendar is a luni-solar calendar based on the phases of the moon, but adjusted for the cycle of Adar II the earth's revolution around the sun. Because the solar year is about 11 days longer than 12 lunar months — though the Bible does not directly mention the addition of "an extra month here or there," without the insertion of an extra month now and then - Jewish festivals would gradually shift outside of the seasons required by the Torah.

And so, according to our tradition the Jewish calendar is based on a cycle of 19 years, of which 12 are common years (12 months) and seven leap years (13 months). The leap years are years 3, 6, 8, 11, 14, 17, and 19.

During a leap year ADAR I (or ADAR ALEPH — "first ADAR") is added before the regular ADAR. ADAR I is actually considered to be the extra month, and has 30 days. ADAR II (or ADAR BET — "second ADAR") is the "real" ADAR, and has the usual 29 days. For this reason, holidays such as PURIM, and according to many authorities, Yahrtzeits that fall in a regular ADAR are observed in ADAR II, not ADAR I.

Why are we telling you all of this? Because this year, 5780, is a "regular" year. Yahrzeits that occur in ADAR I or Adar II are observed in the "only Adar we will have this year."

From the President

It's 2020. It's the start of a contentious presidential election year that promises to be important for the country and the Jewish community. It also promises to be a year filled with incessant political mail, incessant political radio ads, incessant political television commercials, incessant political Tweets and other social

media communications, and incessant political conversations and arguments. For me, it will also be lots of political litigation. In all of that noise, bother, and aggravation, where can one go to escape? Let me suggest coming to *shul*. Whether it is Shabbat services, minyan, or classes, Congregation Anshei Israel can be the calm in the storm. Take refuge with us as we find a little Shabbat Shalom or find a diversion with our Mah Jongg Tournament on January 12 (see insert). Certainly, join us as we destress and connect with nature with our celebration of Tu B'Shevat on February 9 (see page 6). Even better, bring a friend to *shul* with you. They will thank you for the respite from the talking heads and senseless shouting.

On the subject of Tu B'Shevat, my children want to pass along some tree planting tidbits. My oldest suggests that you check out Ecosia (www.ecosia.org), as a search engine alternative to Google. Ecosia advertises that after about 45 searches, a user will have earned a tree to be planted. Ecosia reportedly provides 80% of its profits to local non-profits that plant trees in biodiversity hotspots. The search results are provided by Microsoft's Bing search engine, so it should be a fairly similar experience.

My youngest wanted to share that YouTube star MrBeast is currently working on a program called #TeamTrees with the Arbor Day Foundation. They hope to plant 20 million trees to celebrate MrBeast reaching 20 million subscribers. For every dollar contributed, one tree will be planted. Tesla CEO Elon Musk recently donated \$1 million to the cause. You can find more information on YouTube or www.teamtrees.org

Of course, don't forget that you can plant trees in Israel with the Jewish National Fund. If you buy your trees through the JNF button on our website (*www.caiaz.org*), 20% of your purchase will be donated back to CAI.
