It is with a full heart that we announce an exciting new change to Congregation Anshei Israel. Due to the incredible generosity of Marilyn Einstein and Steve Sim and the Einstein-Sim Family Donor Advised Fund, we will be switching *siddurim* on Shabbat and holidays to *Siddur Lev Shale*m starting May 21st.

Siddur Lev Shalem is the Shabbat and holiday version of our beloved High Holy Days prayer book, *Machzor Lev Shalem*. There are many reasons to love this siddur.

- Its layout is crisp and clear to those of us who use a siddur every day, and for those of us who have never held a Jewish prayer book.
- Each page contains much more transliteration (Hebrew words written in English letters) to help more people feel comfortable in our services.
- In the margins of each page, there are explanations, poems and beautiful interpretations to help direct our hearts in prayer.

What do we do with our older prayer books?

In Judaism, when an object has God's name written in Hebrew, it cannot just be thrown out. In respect to God, we treat these papers, books, scrolls from a *mezuzah*, *teffilin* and Torah scrolls like a person. At the end of their life, we return them to the earth. We bury them with love and respect. Therefore, we will have a community event before the High Holy Days for you to bring any older prayer books or ritual objects you may have, and we will lovingly honor and bury them.
